Our readings today all try to explain something to us.

All try to explain what the Kingdom of God is.

The 1st Reading from Ezekiel says the Kingdom of God is the highest tree on a mountain where all the birds and even God dwells.

The 2nd Reading from Corinthians says it is the place

where all children shall be taught by the Lord.

And 3rd, the Gospel Reading says it is like a mustard seed...

the smallest of seeds...but from which the largest plant shall grow.

So how do WE explain the Kingdom of God? How are we going to explain it? What is the Kingdom of God? Our 1st Reading from the prophet Ezekiel says that the Kingdom of God is a place that is better and higher than all other places. The reading talks about a tree planted high above all other trees on a lofty mountain where it will bear fruit and provide shelter for winged creatures. The kingdom of God is a place of invitation, a place where we can become more than we ever imagined. Our Gospel then describes the Kingdom of God as the place where little things become big things. It is in the Kingdom of God that a tiny mustard seed grows into one of the largest trees so that birds of the sky can dwell in its shade. Is the Kingdom of God a tree? I don't think so. Remember Jesus is talking to us using a parable. A parable is a story used to convey a message or teach us how to live our lives.

I think at the very heart of the parable of the tiny mustard seed we are being told that very small things that we do in our faith can have great and immense rewards. The smallest things we do can achieve world shaking values. St. Paul's Letter to the Corinthians says, "We must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ so that each may receive a judgment according to what he did in life ...whether good or evil." This is about what we do in our lives... Is it good or bad...big or small...? It will matter when we leave this body and go home to meet the Lord.

So, what small things can we do with our mustard seed of faith

so it grows to achieve the Kingdom of God?

I recommend having structured prayer.

Take some time in the morning to offer the day to God

and to ask for his help.

Pray at night to reflect on the day...your successes and failures...

but also thank God for being present in your day.

I witnessed small seeds being scattered

this week at our parish Vacation Bible School.

These Preschool to 5th graders

are the new seeds of faith planted at St. Pius.

These seeds were also nurtured by middle & high school students

that attended this Bible school to help out.

There were also youthful adults that were there to mentor.

How lucky I was to witness this continuation of faith

that was planted by Jesus 2000 years ago.

Think about the small group of 12 Apostles that followed Jesus. Our Church started out with 12 Dynamic Disciples and for 2000 years that mustard seed has grown into a tree that covers the Earth. All of us are capable of great things started in a small way. It is the Holy Spirit that moves and guides our growth. The Holy Spirit has the power to make small things great. Think of it this way...70% of our planet is ocean. If you dissect the ocean, it is really made-up of single drops of water, trillions and trillions of them.

This is also a good time to scatter seeds of welcome

for our brothers and sisters at St. Pius...

those we have not seen here in awhile ...

maybe make a personal call or visit.

When your mustard seed of faith grows taller...

maybe you can think about joining the Knights of Columbus or CCW.

This is what this Gospel of the mustard seed has been about since Jesus taught it to his disciples 2000 years ago.
